Global Champagnat has set up an online platform called Agora to facilitate Marist schools to collaborate, explore and share their responses to the above challenges. The concept of global citizenship is a further development of Marcellin's dream that belonging to something bigger than ourselves is a common search we all aspire to as Marist family. This Global Champagnat agora platform will allow us to collaborate

and build up the Marist community by sharing our resources and experiences to help all of us, fulfill our true potential as educators and students. We plan in the new year to help schools become more aware of the possibilities of Global Champagnat and encourage them to get

Why be a Marist **Brother today?**

The General Council has proclaimed a «Year for Marist Vocations» for the period from 20 May 2022 to 6 June 2023. There are two ways of life for following Jesus as Marist: As Marist Brother or as lay Marist. In both ways we together are committed as Marists to the «matter of Jesus». I would like to take a closer look to the way of life of the Marist Brothers: Why be a Marist Brother today?

At the beginning I want to describe our living in community: we pray together, we work together, we celebrate together,

we present to each other our diversity, our abilities, we help each other and console each other. And we want certainly always to forgive each other.

In our personal prayer we ask ourselves: «What does God want from me today?» We also pray a

lot for other people. The laity, because of their professional duties, do not have as much time to pray as we do. We also pray in their place and for them. It is not always easy for us to find the right balance between prayer and work.

We have our possessions in common. «They shared everything they had» (Acts 4:32). By our life without personal tenure,

each brother has access to the common possessions and facilities. We love a simple lifestyle.

As consecrated men we give ourselves at God's disposal with our whole existence. In obedience to our superiors, we work where we are really needed. Our superiors have a greater overview of the needs than we do. In this way, obedience gives our lives a higher sense.

This kind of our total commitment of self-giving to the service for God, the willingness to be available and mobile to everywhere, to change our place of work as needed, this is only possible

> without marriage: we live in celibacy. By the vows of chastity, poverty and obedience we try to become like the virgin, poor and obedient Jesus. Our way of life wants to be a testimony of the Lord.

It may seem harsh to

break away from relationships that have become dear to us when we move, but we are given the gift of Holy Mass every day in all our local communities. We may receive the Lord in the Holy Eucharist. It is a great gift and gives us strength for the day. Whoever receives Christ will be transformed, will be transformed into him.

Our model is Mary. In the same way as

she said «yes», we too want to say «yes» to God's plans for us. Mary shows us the way to Jesus.

Our founder, Saint Marcellin, had many visions. We want to make these visions a reality. For him it was very important: every child has its own personality and dignity. In education, we have to take time for the children, explaining them instead of strong discipline. We are in special ways concerned about the most disadvantaged, the marginalised. We want to be witnesses of hope for them, courageously arouse the world and radiate joy.

The life as Marist Brother is a real option. In my prayer I ask the Lord if he wants this for me. Do I hear the silent call of God?



Since March 2021, our Province of Europe Central West has been joined as the fifth Province to the International Commission of Communication to the Provinces of Mediteránea, Iberica, L'Hermitage and Compostela, in order to create a European platform of communication.

Since then, the representatives of the

provinces connect monthly to online meetings to bundle the news of the provinces and publish it on the now newly designed homepage www.champagnat.eu in the social networks. Occasionally, meetings are also held for personal exchange. And so, from September 26-29, 2022, representatives followed by a secretary traveled from Spain to

Mindelheim to get a first impression of our Marist institutions in Mindelheim and our province.

The enthusiasm was felt from the beginning when they got to know our newly designed rooms of the Corum (chapel between the Bruderhaus and the Cmi House), the accommodations in the Cmi House for the volunteers and the «s'Jugendhaus», designed for multiple activities. In turn, the people of the Garden Club vouch for the garden to look well cared for and beautiful, and thus be part of the offer that the Westerhelling wants to provide. The Garden Club guarantees that people who come for stillness can enjoy the beauty of plants, shrubs and flowers in the garden. They can enjoy everything that grows and blooms. The Garden Club makes it possible for people to come in wonder and so their lives may (re)shine.

When people know from each other that they are secure with each other, people become powerful. They start looking and walking differently.

Such small miracles happen in a small place on the outskirts of Nijmegen. Just without fuss.

Once in a while it becomes visible and tangible through a chestnut cake or other attentive, valuable gifts.

How so an enrichment of activities?

The Westerhelling wants to be a place of Attentive Living. These are words that say in a simple way how our Marian spirituality can be lived. Attentiveness wants to be the guide to make space for facets of life and the uniqueness of mission at Westerhelling.

Attention leads to a contemplative attitude in one's own everyday life and in looking outwards. To the world around us.

The attentive outward gaze has shown us the young generation that in our time is looking for stillness and for a place to embark on the quest to live their lives, received as a gift, their own way.

In recent months, the question of the people of the Garden Club has caught our attention: can we find a place with you to give meaning to our lives? They have come our way.



The people of Westerhelling have said, «come and join us. Our house and grounds are what you are looking for».

The Garden Club gives the Westerhelling the opportunity to answer a need in our society: to provide a simple, quiet place where people, doing well, can work in the garden and with satisfaction themselves.

Chestnut cake

It happens regularly that people come to gather chestnuts in the front garden of the Westerhelling in October. This year, one of the Garden Club participants said he would be the first to gather chestnuts. He said he had his own recipe to make a cake.

A few days later, he brought a piece of his own baked chestnut cake.

The Garden Club is an activity of the RIBW (Regional Institution for Protected Housing) and gives people with a distance to the labour market an opportunity to work in a garden project. For several months now, there has been an agreement between RIBW and the brothers. About 25 people come to work in the garden every week.

The Garden Club is not only a good help in maintaining the garden. It is also, and certainly first and foremost, an enrichment of the activities at Westerhelling.

18 - 20 November / Furth

The Province Assembly which took place in Furth from 18 - 20 November was an important moment in our life as a Province, as it was the moment when we entered more intentionally into the process of moving from being a Province to being a District of the Province of the Hermitage.

The Assembly began with a presentation about the history of the different countries of our own Province. I though this might be rather boring, with too many details, but it proved to be interesting. For example, I learned that at one point the Belgian Brothers were responsible for 70 schools in Belgium. The Province of West central Europe also has its own points of celebration, not least the significant achievement of forging one new Province with its own identity from the four previous Provinces which came together in 2000, managing the process of diminishment while at the same time supporting mission, and the establishment of the Mission Council with the active participation of many lay people across the five countries of our Province. The presentation from the Hermitage

province, which was represented by the Provincial, Br. Gabriel Villa – Real, the Vice-Provincial, Br. Xavier Giné, Llorens Claramunt from Catalunya, and Danai Anagnostopoulou from Greece, focused on establishing a «network of networks» as a way of working together which represented differences, and avoided a way of working which was overly hierarchic or centralised.

As the Assembly progressed, one of the key points that emerged was the tension between some key tasks which we need to attend to, and the process which will take us into this new reality, given some of the concerns that have been raised about aspects of the process which has led us to this point. Tasks include preparing and writing statutes, establishing clearly what is meant by «depending» on The Hermitage Province, dealing with the loss involved in no longer being a province, focusing on opportunities for working together in mission, and how to engage with the Province of the Hermitage, which has a number of Province structures. The Province of West Central Europe could be seen as «structure-light,» partly due to our limited capacity, but also due to

a concern not to create structures and meetings which can become burdensome to manage and maintain.

The meeting was characterised by a spirit of openness and co-operation. Rob Walsh facilitated in a way which helped the important themes to emerge and for the key points to be presented and discussed. At the end of the meeting there were two important energies in the room, both of which need to be heard and respected. In the first place it was suggested that the two provinces need to do their own work to discuss the implications of this change for themselves, and to devise a process that helps us to end this stage of our history well, so that we can embrace the change positively. At the same time there was recognition of the need to have more clarity before 23rd November 2023, when the Province will become a district of the Hermitage Province. The Province Assembly was an important point in the journey towards this destination, with Brothers and lay people from each of the countries and Provinces involved in this process of change.

Province of West Central Europe

Provincial Assembly from 18 to 20 November 2022

From the 18th to the 20th November, 19 Brothers and Lay Marists from the Province of Central-West Europe, as well as 4 Brothers and Lay Marists invited from the Province of L'Hermitage, met in Furth, Germany, for a Provincial Assembly.

After the meeting of the Provincial Councils of the two Marist Provinces which took place in September in Dublin, this Assembly marked a new stage on the common journey.

On the 15th of August, Brother Ernesto Sánchez, Superior General, informed the Provinces of Central West Europe and L'Hermitage that the present Province of Central West Europe will become a district canonically dependent on the Province of L'Hermitage from October 2023.

The objectives of the meeting were as follows

- To review together the path taken by the WCE Province in recent months;
- To get to know better the realities lived in the two Provinces:
- To share what is important for each member of the assembly in relation to Marist life and mission:



■ To propose measures to be taken in the months to come.

In this way, the participants had the opportunity to become better acquainted with the realities lived in the two Provinces, with their challenges and priorities for the future. They were able to freely express their feelings and what was important to them. Several themes to be worked on in the coming months were retained: communication, the continuity of the dialogue between us, the priorities concerning the mission, the drawing up of the Statutes of the future District, while deepening mutual knowledge, etc.

Indeed, it is by fostering relationships and

mutual knowledge that trust is built. This makes possible a good collaboration in view of the development and continuity of Marist life and mission in the countries where we are, with fewer Brothers and more lay people in positions of responsibility.

The spirit of openness and fraternity, the moments of exchange in small groups, the moments of conviviality and the warm welcome of our confreres from Germany and from the host centre, allowed us to live a pleasant meeting. I thank each participant as well as Rob Walsh who guided the exchanges and Nancy Camilléri who helped with the translation.

International Forum on the Lay Marist Vocation **Programm in Rome 2022**

The world-famous Marist welcoming culture also awaited me in Rome. I felt warmly welcomed in many languages when I entered the Spiritual Retreat House «Nostra Signora Madre della Misericordia" on Monte Cucco. Immediately a lively exchange with old companions and an interested meeting of new faces began. This multicultural dialogue and the willingness to communicate with each other were a tangible and visible sign of personal joy and an open heart for global understanding.

After a day of getting to know each other, the work on the main topics 1 with 4 followed on Saturday. This process was only interrupted by the Sunday excursion to Ancient Rome and the subsequent visit to the General House. The cordial invitation of Superior General Ernesto Sanchez - the house is always open to all Marists - was clearly concluded by a joint lunch, an interesting tour of the house and the impressive Eucharistic celebration in the evening.

In the following week, the focus was on intensive exchange in small groups and the plenum. Here, the many personal contributions and testimonies of Marist life on the ground enriched the struggle for substantive syntheses.

The efforts to find a common path that includes the broad diversity of Marist life were energetic dancing and music, loosening

meditative dances exercises and creative elements with various materials.

Enriching and motivating at the same time were the many gifts brought from the individual provinces. The work on the four focal points progressed well due to this encouraging abundance of impressions.

The prevailing diversity of cultures was not felt as a hindrance that separates us from each other, but rather the participants enjoyed the different experiences in the provinces of this world as an enriching element that broadens their personal horizons.

Purposefully steered by the competent management team, it quickly became clear that the broad basis of the opinions submitted could not be conclusively presented within a week by a document and draft resolutions for the four topics to be dealt with could be taken! The event with the motto «Welcoming, nurturing, living and sharing» was relieved of the time pressure. With the help of the example of a running relay, it was pointed out that optimal conditions should be created here in Rome, which must be adopted and further worked on in the following two years, worldwide in the local provinces.

At the concluding divine service on the last day of the meeting, gratitude for the time together and the joy of the experienced togetherness were in the foreground.

There is no question that in the phase of the subsequent, two-year online consultations, the cooperation will be significantly improved by the fact that we are now dealing with wellknown companions with whom we can share beautiful memories sustainably.

Tell us a little bit about yourself


